

If you get lost in the snow of white keys, then you should practice the A D and E scales with your eyes closed. Remember the blind pianists like Art Tatum and George Shearing that were mentioned earlier: they never had problems with finding white keys because their hands had more knowledge than our eyes do! Here are the three hand positions for E minor as taken from the keyboard diagram above.

ETUDE #4 in E MINOR

Even though the hand travels quite a bit in this slow piece, most of the notes occur in little four note handfuls. The right hand is based on the E minor scale but the left hand chords seem to drift between the keys of C and A major. Mentally add six flats and Etude #4 will automatically be transposed to Eb minor. It sounds great in that key!
